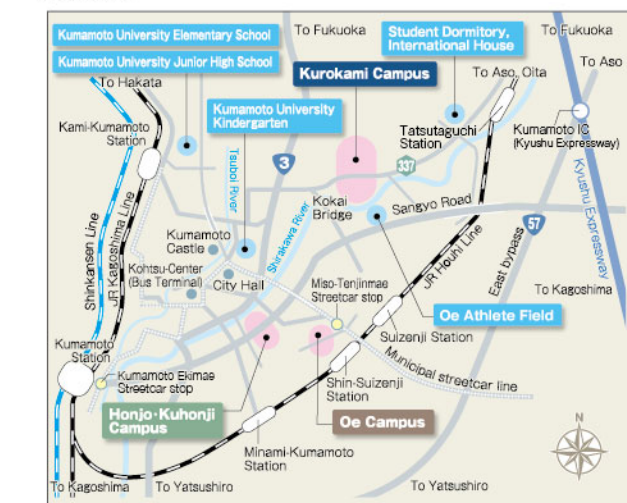

## 1 Yamasaki Memorial Hall



## Kumamoto University Hospital

As the only university hospital in Kumamoto prefecture, it contributes to the region by providing highly advanced medical technology and nurturing medical physicians. The hospital has 845 beds and over 1,300 out-patients a day, and is also certified as a center of collaboration for cancer treatment in Kumamoto prefecture.

Commemorating the achievements of Dr. Masatada Yamasaki, the father of the restoration of the School of Medicine, the hall was completed in 1931. The hall was moved 48m away from its original location, when the new Clinic Center Building was constructed in 2006.

## 2 Center for AIDS Research



The center was established in 1997 as the first AIDS research facility amongst Japanese universities. Cutting-edge research is conducted to develop new methods of treatment and prevention utilizing the immunological approach.

## 3 Institute of Molecular Embryology and Genetics



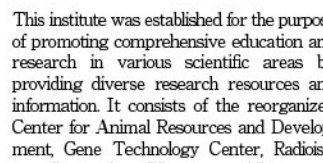
The institute promotes comprehensive research in life science and medical fields for the establishment of medical transplantation through the development of basic research. It is also the only research institute dealing with "molecular embryology and genetics" in Japan.

## 4 International Research Center for Medical Sciences (IRCMS)



IRCMS has a strong interest with the highest priority in developing a global collaboration. At this time fundamental research in the areas of Hematology, Vascular Biology, Cancer and Retrovirology has begun, with plans to expand into basic and translational biology and medicine.

## 5 Institute of Resource Development and Analysis



This institute was established for the purpose of promoting comprehensive education and research in various scientific areas by providing diverse research resources and information. It consists of the reorganized Center for Animal Resources and Development, Gene Technology Center, Radioisotope Center, three RI centers and Instrumental Analysis Center. They conduct research in the university, in Japan and other countries to provide the support of life science research and supply of research resources.

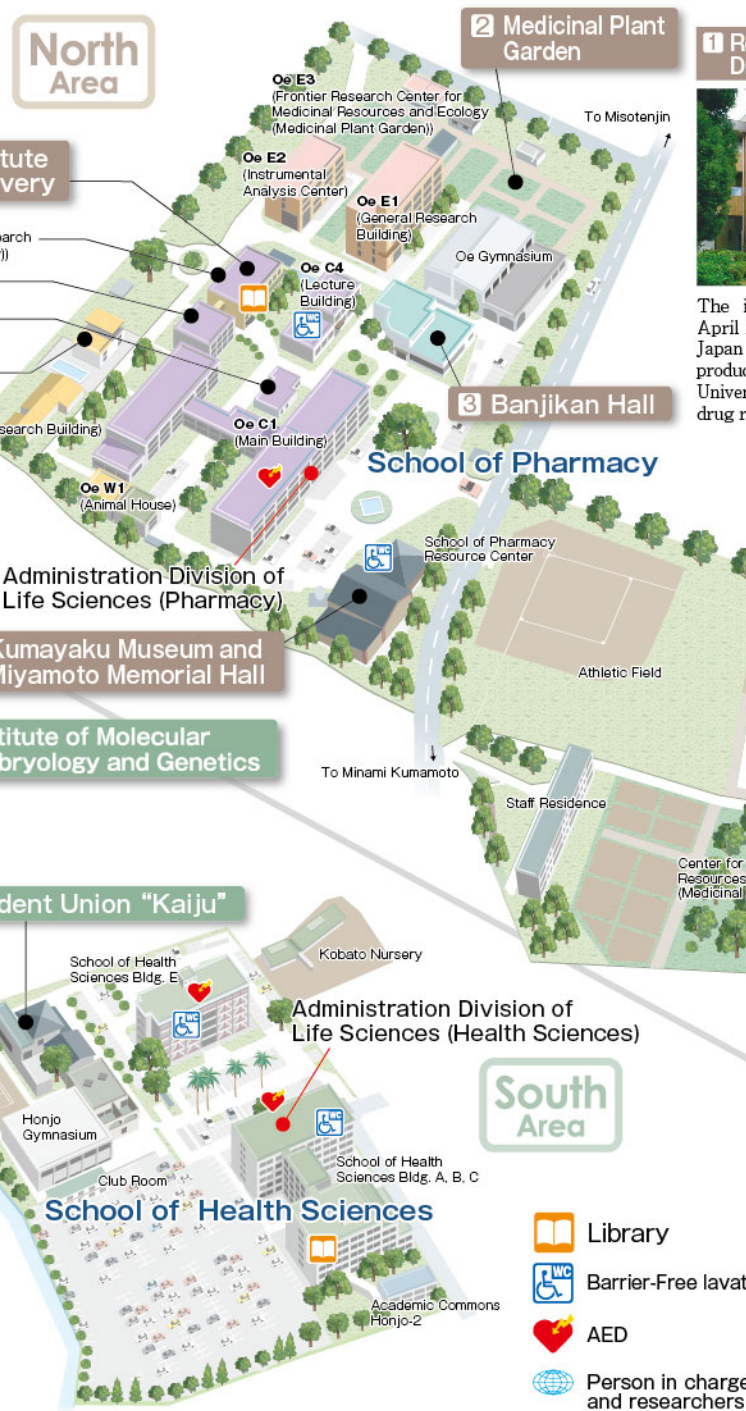

## 1 The Red Gate



The gate has been well known as "the Red Gate" since it was relocated as the main gate of the Fifth High School in 1889.

## 2 The Memorial Museum of the Fifth High School



The red brick building was completed in 1889 as the main building for the Fifth High School, where Yakumo Koizumi and Soseki Natsume gave lectures. The hall which also holds the information plaza, offers historical data and literature to the general public. Free admission. Opens from 1000 to 1600, except Tuesdays.

## 3 The Chemical Laboratory of the Fifth High School



The red brick building, like the main building, was also completed in 1889 as the Chemical Laboratory for the Fifth High School. It includes a stone-made testing benches and a lecture hall (commonly called staircase classroom).

Books, stationery, convenience goods, tickets and the university original products are sold at the shop. Opens from 8:10 to 19:00 on weekdays.

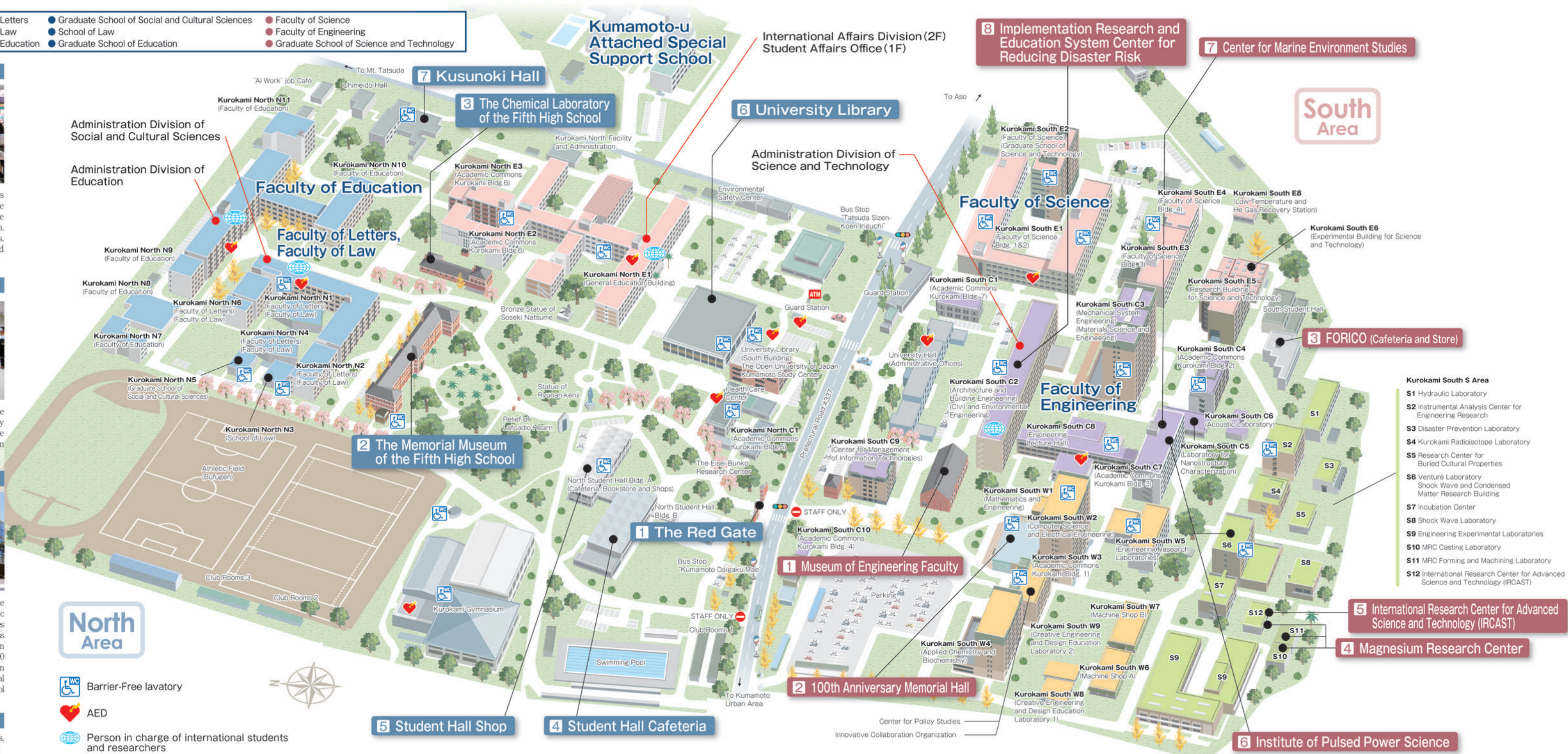
## 6 University Library

## 1 Museum of Engineering Faculty



The building was completed in 1908 as a machine experimental factory of Kumamoto Junior College of Technology. The red-brick building and machine tools were designated as a Nationally Important Cultural Property. Also these are certified as "Machine Heritage" by the Japan Society of Mechanical Engineers. The building is opened to the public every third Friday from 1300 to 1600.

## 2 100th Anniversary Memorial Hall



In commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the Faculty of Engineering, the hall was completed in 2004 with donations from alumni, faculty-related people and corporations. Events such as lectures and concerts are held in the hall.

## 3 FORICO (Cafeteria and Store)



The nickname "FORICO" was coined by a student, meaning "for students of Faculties of Science and Engineering". Shop & Bakery opens from 9:30 to 20:00 and Cafe & Restaurant opens from 10:00 to 20:00 on weekdays.

## 4 Magnesium Research Center

The center has been extensively involved in a variety of magnesium-related research area since its establishment in December, 2011. These include alloy design, casting metal formation, mechanical properties, corrosion surface treatment, and recycling.

## 5 International Research Center for Advanced Science and Technology (IRCAST)

IRCAST was established to promote the international joint research works on the frontier of material sciences. IRCAST has also a significant role to enlarge the international research networks for advanced material sciences among overseas universities and institutions.

## 6 Institute of Pulsed Power Science

The mission of the institute is to promote basic research into and new theories of pulsed power science through international-oriented problem solving on an interdisciplinary basis as well as to train globally active young researchers and engineers.

## 7 Center for Marine Environment Studies

The center conducts education and research in areas such as basic science and applied science, that focuses mainly on the marine environment around the Ariake Sea and the Yatsushiro Sea.

## 8 Implementation Research and Education System Center for Reducing Disaster Risk

The center promotes education and research activities about reduction of disasters to aim at early implementation and sustainable development for robust-and-resilient society to carry out prompt and flexible response to disasters.
